Mt. A must not destroy 'cenotaph'

To the Editor:

Recently you published a letter which listed reasons why the First World War Memorial Library at Mount Allison University should not be demolished. The letter gave 10 reasons why it should be preserved. I offer another valid reason why the Memorial Library building should not fall to a wrecking ball.

Since the late 1920s the building has stood as a fitting reminder of the young Mount Allison students who answered the call of king and country in defence of peace and life. Seventy-three of those young students lie buried in war torn countries of Western Europe. Their names grace gravestones in those countries, and at Mt. Allison on a plaque.

Because their bodies lie buried in Europe the War memorial building on the Mt. A campus became a cenotaph, as it is an edifice raised in remembrance of those who died and whose bodies are buried elsewhere. As a cenotaph, the building has an aura about and within it. For many it becomes a spiritual and sacred place.

The university must seek property elsewhere to build the proposed performing arts facility being planned. No one will ever fault those who did so.
